The EMS communication system is a complex network designed to facilitate the rapid and efficient flow of information between various stakeholders. Key components include: Base Station: A stationary radio located in a strategic position, such as a hospital, dispatch center, or a high vantage point. Base station: dispatch coordination area. Mobile transmitter / receivers: vehicle-based, long range. Digital. EMS telecommunications equipment shall be configured to allow the EMS MD, or designee, to monitor all vehicle to hospital transmissions and hospital to vehicle transmissions within the System (b). Medical Emergency Communications of Illinois (MERCII) VHF/UHF base station, telemetry. Patients must be able to access the system, the system must be

able to dispatch units, EMTs must have a means of communicating with medical direction and receiving facility, and EMTs must be able to communicate vital information to other personnel. It is a complex network composed of people.

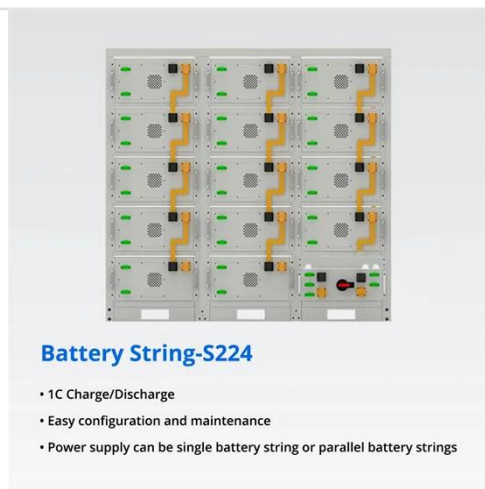

Alternatively, a base station (including a mobile relay station) which is controlled by radio may be identified by the transmission of the call sign of the station at which communications originate.

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
